## Summary and Wrap-Up

**Jon A. Krosnick:** We have to leave in a few minutes, and so we're now to the closing thank-you's part of this. So thank you for this. It's really been fabulous. [Applause] We got a ton out of this.

Again, as I said earlier, you have no idea how so many of your comments are just perfect, what we need and really helpful to push us in directions we're already thinking about.

But flipping it around the other way, what I'm driving to is we can continue to be of value to you along the lines of if you had an email type of system where you would send out queries. I know you have your Online Commons and Data Commons.

But just for those of us here if you're doing things, as we've learned from AAPORnet, if you just send out something like "what do you think about this?" you would probably get replies back bounced off of the expertise that's in this room, which might be valuable. So I would suggest that.

Jon A. Krosnick: Yes, we will do that.

**Frank Newport:** Create a mini LISTSERV kind of list and just send out questions with things you're running, and you'll get back some interesting replies. We'll be able to skip important work to answer those queries online, you know? It will be more interesting than some of the other stuff.

**Arthur Lupia:** The other acknowledgement that's important to make is that to the National Science Foundation and the ESRC, because they not only support us financially doing this, they've actually encouraged us. We could be working with a science foundation that said, "Oh, no, you shouldn't pursue these types of relationships," but in fact they want us to, and it's just not us wanting to; it's them encouraging us to do that. So to the extent that you wonder what the relationship to NSF is, I mean, it's a very important

part of what we're doing and the reason why we got to come here with you today and fly our friends over from the U.K.
