CODE NUMBERS 001 THROUGH 314 ARE SELF REPRESENTING PSU'S.

CODE NUMBERS 365 THROUGH 996 ARE NON-SELF REPRESENTING PSU'S

EACH PSU IS DENOTED BY A PAIR OF THREE DIGIT CODES (301-302 BALTIMORE CITY, FOR EXAMPLE). THE ALLOCATION OF PAIRS OF CODES TO THE VARIOUS PSU'S HAS TO DO WITH SAMPLING PROCEDURES AND SAMPLING VALIDATION. THE SAMPLE FROM EACH PSU IS DIVIDED INTO TWO EQUAL GROUPS OF INDIVIDUALS. ONE GROUP IS GIVEN THE ODD NUMBERED CODE (301 IN OUR EXAMPLE) AND THE OTHER GROUP IS DESIGNATED BY THE PAIR NUMBERED CODE (302). THE VALIDITY OF THE SAMPLE IS TESTED BY COMPARING ONE GROUP AGAINST THE OTHER. THIS METHOD IS WIDELY USED IN CONNECTION WITH SELF REPRESENTING PSU'S AND NOT SO WIDELY USED FOR NON-SELF REPRESENTING PSU'S.
