THESE SERIES ARE COMPLETE EXCEPT FOR THE FOLLOWING OMITTED
NUMBERS: 0241, 0242, 0315, 0367, 0685, 0779, 1021, 1219,
1343, 2042, 2073.

RESPONDENTS 0315, 1343 AND 2042 WERE INCORRECTLY SELECTED,
BUT THEIR DATA WERE RETAINED BECAUSE THE SELECTIONS HAD BEEN
ACCIDENTAL. THEIR INTERVIEW NUMBERS WERE CHANGED TO REFLECT
THIS, AND THE INTERVIEW NUMBERS 0905, 1909 AND 2904 WERE
ASSIGNED RESPECTIVELY. THIS ACCIDENTAL IMPROPER SELECTION
WAS DISCOVERED WHILE THE ARCHIVE WAS PROCESSING THE DATA.
IN SOME 1968 INTERMEDIATE DATASETS THE ORIGINAL NUMBERS WILL
APPEAR; IN THE FINAL DATASET THE NEWLY ASSIGNED NUMBERS
APPEAR IN THE PROPER ASCENDING SORT ORDER SEQUENCE (I.E. CASE
0905 IS POSITIONED AFTER CASE 0904, 1909 AFTER 1908, AND SO
ON).

AS MENTIONED IN THE INTRODUCTION, THE NATIONAL CROSS-SECTION
SAMPLE WAS DIVIDED INTO TWO EQUAL HALF SAMPLES. MOST
RESPONDENTS IN THE FIRST HALF SAMPLE WERE INTERVIEWED DURING
THE PERIOD SEPT. 16-OCT. 9, WHILE MOST RESPONDENTS IN THE
SECOND HALF SAMPLE WERE INTERVIEWED DURING THE PERIOD
OCT. 10-NOV. 4. HOWEVER, THESE INTERVIEWING DATES WERE NOT
FOLLOWED RIGIDLY, AND FOR ANY GIVEN RESPONDENT HIS INDIVIDUAL
DATE OF INTERVIEW SHOULD BE CONSULTED (REF. NO. 23).

THE THREE SERIES WITH 9 AS THE SECOND DIGIT ARE THE RESULT OF
CASES IN WHICH THE INTERVIEWER APPARENTLY MADE A MISTAKE IN
FOLLOWING THE HOUSEHOLD SELECTION TABLE AND ACCIDENTALLY
SELECTED AN INCORRECT RESPONDENT. WHEN THIS INCORRECT
SELECTION WAS DISCOVERED IN TIME, THE INTERVIEWER WAS SENT

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BACK TO TRY TO GET AN INTERVIEW WITH THE CORRECT RESPONDENT. HOWEVER, WHEN THIS WAS NOT POSSIBLE THE INTERVIEW WAS RETAINED IN THE DATA SET ON THE ASSUMPTION THAT THE INCORRECT SELECTION WAS ACCIDENTAL AND THAT ITS INCLUSION WOULD NOT BIAS THE SAMPLE SERIOUSLY. HOWEVER, IN CASES WHERE IT WAS CLEAR THAT THE INTERVIEWER HAD CONSCIOUSLY SUBSTITUTED AN INCORRECT RESPONDENT BECAUSE THE CORRECT RESPONDENT WAS NOT AVAILABLE THE INTERVIEW WAS EXCLUDED FROM THE DATA SET.

A WEIGHTING FACTOR WAS INTRODUCED IN THIS STUDY TO PERMIT THE INCLUSION OF THE NEGRO SUPPLEMENT SAMPLE DATA WITH THE CROSS-SECTION DATA. THE NEGRO SUPPLEMENT SAMPLE WAS OBTAINED FROM CERTAIN SECONDARY SELECTION UNITS IN WHICH LARGE NUMBERS OF BLACK RESPONDENTS HAD BEEN FOUND ON SOME PREVIOUS SURVEY RESEARCH CENTER STUDIES. IN MOST OF THESE SECONDARY SELECTION UNITS, ALL SEGMENTS WERE RECHECKED FOR BLACK OCCUPANTS, AND WHEN FOUND THEY WERE INTERVIEWED AS PART OF THE NEGRO SUPPLEMENT SAMPLE AND ASSIGNED A WEIGHT OF ONE. IN THE REMAINING SECONDARY SELECTION UNITS THIS RECHECKING WAS CARRIED OUT IN ONLY HALF OF THE APPROPRIATE SEGMENTS, AND NEGROES INTERVIEWED IN THESE SEGMENTS WERE GIVEN A WEIGHT OF TWO. BLACK RESPONDENTS IN THESE SECONDARY SELECTION UNITS WHO WERE PART OF THE CROSS-SECTION SAMPLE ARE WEIGHTED ONE AS PART OF THE TOTAL NEGRO SAMPLE (CROSS-SECTION BLACKS + NEGRO SUPPLEMENT BLACKS). HOWEVER, BLACK RESPONDENTS WHO WERE FOUND IN THE CROSS-SECTION SAMPLE IN SECONDARY SELECTION UNITS WHICH WERE NOT CHECKED AS PART OF THE NEGRO SUPPLEMENT ARE WEIGHTED TWO AS PART OF THE TOTAL NEGRO SAMPLE. SINCE THE PURPOSE OF THE NEGRO SUPPLEMENT SAMPLE WAS EFFECTIVELY TO DOUBLE THE NEGRO SAMPLE OF THE STUDY, ALL WHITE RESPONDENTS ARE GIVEN WEIGHTS OF TWO WHEN COMBINED WITH THE NEGRO SUPPLEMENT DATA. IF ONE WISHED TO LOOK AT THE CROSS-SECTION DATA ALONE, ALL CROSS-SECTION RESPONDENTS ARE CONSIDERED TO HAVE HAD AN EQUAL CHANCE OF SELECTION AND THE WEIGHT VARIABLE SHOULD NOT BE USED. HOWEVER, THE WEIGHT VARIABLE SHOULD ALWAYS BE USED IF ONE WISHES TO MAXIMIZE HIS DATA BASE BY COMBINING THE CROSS-SECTION AND NEGRO SUPPLEMENT DATA, OR IF ONE WISHES TO LOOK AT THE TOTAL NEGRO SAMPLE ALONE (FILTERING ON RACE, REF.NO. 264).

IT WAS INTENDED TO RE-INTERVIEW ALL VALID PRE-ELECTION RESPONDENTS IN THE POST-ELECTION PERIOD. THIS OF COURSE PROVED IMPOSSIBLE AS SOME RESPONDENTS MOVED, ONE DIED, OTHERS REFUSED TO GRANT A SECOND INTERVIEW, AND OTHERS WERE NOT ABLE TO BE CONTACTED AT THEIR RESIDENCES. THEREFORE IT WAS FELT DESIRABLE TO TRY TO CONTACT THESE NON-REINTERVIEW RESPONDENTS WITH A MAIL QUESTIONNAIRE. TWO-PAGE QUESTIONNAIRES ASKING ABOUT THE RESPONDENT'S VOTES AND ABOUT HIS PERCEPTIONS OF THE PRESIDENTIAL RACE (Q. 18-19, 22-25, 27-34) WERE MAILED TO 180 NON-POST-RESPONDENTS FOR WHOM SOME SORT OF MAILING ADDRESS WAS AVAILABLE. THIS, AND A SECOND MAILING, RESULTED IN 36 RETURNED QUESTIONNAIRES (RESPONDENTS

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CODED 3 IN REF. NO. 5) FOR THE COMBINED NEGRO SUPPLEMENT AND CROSS-SECTION SAMPLE.

THERE WERE ALSO A FEW RESPONDENTS WHO GRANTED ONLY PARTIAL

INTERVIEWS AND THESE WERE RETAINED IN THE DATA SET IF THEY INCLUDED THE VOTE QUESTIONS (2 IN REF. NO. 5). AND THERE WERE ALSO SOME POST-ELECTION REFUSALS WHO GAVE SOME INFORMATION ABOUT THEIR VOTING BEHAVIOR WHEN THE INTERVIEWER CONTACTED THEM FOR THE REINTERVIEW. ALL SUCH INFORMATION WAS CODED FOR SUCH RESPONDENTS (INDICATED BY 4 IN REF. NO. 5).

Q. 71. AS YOU KNOW, THERE WERE MANY PEOPLE MENTIONED THIS PAST YEAR AS POSSIBLE CANDIDATES FOR PRESIDENT BY THE POLITICAL PARTIES. WE WOULD LIKE TO GET YOUR FEELINGS TOWARD SOME OF THESE PEOPLE.

I HAVE HERE A CARD (INTERVIEWER HANDS OVER CARD #5) ON WHICH THERE IS SOMETHING THAT LOOKS LIKE A THERMOMETER. WE CALL IT A "FEELING THERMOMETER" BECAUSE IT MEASURES YOUR FEELINGS TOWARDS THESE PEOPLE. YOU PROBABLY REMEMBER THAT WE USED SOMETHING LIKE THIS IN OUR EARLIER INTERVIEW WITH YOU.

HERE'S HOW IT WORKS. IF YOU DON'T FEEL PARTICULARLY WARM OR COLD TOWARD A PERSON, THEN YOU SHOULD PLACE HIM IN THE MIDDLE OF THE THERMOMETER, AT THE 50 DEGREE MARK.

IF YOU HAVE A WARM FEELING TOWARD A PERSON, OR FEEL FAVORABLY TOWARD HIM, YOU WOULD GIVE HIM A SCORE SOMEWHERE BETWEEN 50 DEGREES AND 100 DEGREES, DEPENDING ON HOW WARM YOUR FEELING IS TOWARD THAT PERSON.

ON THE OTHER HAND, IF YOU DON'T FEEL VERY FAVORABLY TOWARD A PERSON -- THAT IS, IF YOU DON'T CARE TOO MUCH FOR HIM -- THEN YOU WOULD PLACE HIM SOMEWHERE BETWEEN 0 DEGREES AND 50 DEGREES OF COURSE, IF YOU DON'T KNOW TOO MUCH ABOUT A PERSON, JUST TELL ME AND WE'LL GO ON TO THE NEXT NAME.
